How to Participate: Daisies and Brownies complete 3 of 5 steps, Juniors and Cadettes complete 4 of 5 steps, and Seniors and Ambassadors complete all 5 steps. Step 1 is required for all levels.

- 3. Medal of Honor and Bronze Cross
- 4. What Does It Take?
- 5. Go For Gold!


Each month will contain both research and activities which will need to be completed to earn the patch.

Ready to go ALL IN? Order all your monthly patches at once! The All-In order is \$30 and is due October 15. Patches will still be mailed out on a monthly basis but this option allows you to order all patches up front at the beginning of the year.

Patch orders are due the 15th of the following month. For example, October's patch registration is due November 15th. Each patch is custom designed and will be mailed out roughly 8-10 weeks after the order is due. Individual patches are \$3 each.

Medal of Honor and Bronze Cross

These awards are given at the council level to Girl Scouts who have saved or attempted to save a life, either with or without risk to their own lives. Research Girl Scouts who have earned either the Medal of Honor or the Bronze Cross awards. Then, answer the questions below.

What Does It Take?

Daisies and Brownies: take a look at what it takes to earn your Bronze Award. Juniors: look at what you would need to do to earn your Bronze now or, eventually, your Silver Award. Cadettes: what do you need to do to earn your Silver Award or, later on, your Gold Award? Seniors and Ambassadors: what does it take to earn your Gold Award?

Cadettes must spent a minimum of 50 hours on their Silver Award Project.
